Hello and welcome to the **2026 Show Schedule**.

All shows will take place in the Society's hall. Entries for the show can be made between **Monday & Thursday (Spring/Summer) and Monday to Friday (Autumn Show) up to 8.00pm the week of the show by email, text or phone**. This allows for paperwork to be completed before set-up for the shows on the Friday or Saturday before the show. Staging for these events will start at **8.00am** on the **Saturday morning** for the Spring & Summer Shows and **8.00am** on the **Sunday morning** for the Autumn Show. Doors will close at 10.00am SHARP and entrants will have until 10.15am to finish staging. **JUDGING WILL COMMENCE at 10.30am. Staging on set-up days is by appointment only.** Please complete a 'VARIETY NAME' card if you know the name of your exhibit as this adds interest to the exhibits. Cards are available from the Administration Desk.

All our Shows are open - you don't have to be a member of CHS to enter (unless stated within the schedule). So why not challenge family, friends, or fellow allotment holders to grow or bake the best exhibit. We also have specific Children's Classes for children under 12 years of age.

Whilst you are visiting the show, why not stop for a cup of tea or coffee and a slice of homemade cake at our Pop-Up Café. There will be raffle tickets for sale in the show hall and our shop will be open in the afternoon during show times until **3.00pm** (if volunteer staff/cashiers are available).

Doors will open for public viewing from 1.30pm until 4.00pm. Raffle winner announcements and presentation of Awards will commence from 3.30pm onwards.

Any help to either set up and clear away tables at the end of the day, baking cakes for the Café or help on the day will always be very much appreciated. Please contact the Show Secretary if you can help.

If you make a cake for us to sell in the Café can you please list all the ingredients used in case of any allergic reactions.

Fingers crossed for a good gardening season and good luck when you enter the shows.

SHOW RULES

1. All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor and have been in their possession for at least **three months** prior to the show, unless otherwise stated. No exhibitor may stage more than one exhibit in the same class.
2. More than one member of a household may exhibit from the same garden, provided that each exhibit is a different kind (not variety) of plant, flower, fruit or vegetable.
3. Prizes will be awarded according to the merit of the exhibits irrespective of the number of entries in any class; additional prizes may be awarded at the discretion of the judges. The award of any prize or trophy can be withheld where the judges consider the standard of the exhibits are of insufficient merit.
4. All exhibits are accepted at the risk of the exhibitor. The Society shall not be liable for loss or damage, by theft or any other cause.
5. Exhibits should be staged in/on the vases, plates, boxes or bowls provided by the Society. Jugs must be provided by the exhibitor.
6. Exhibits should be correctly named and all vegetables washed.
7. Judging will be conducted under the rules of the various bodies to which the Society is affiliated.
8. Any matter not covered by these rules will be dealt with by the Show Secretary or Committee.
9. All trophies are perpetual and the property of the Society; they must be returned to the Show Secretary fourteen days before the Shows.
10. Objections shall be lodged with the Show Secretary, whose decision is final.
11. Entry forms must be received by the closing date shown for each Show.
12. Novice or Beginners Classes – a novice or beginner is a person who has not won a first prize in that section at any Society Show.
13. Entries must be staged from 8.00am to 10.00am on the day of the Show. Exhibitors have until 10.15 to finish staging their exhibits. Everyone must then leave the hall, other than Officials.
14. Exhibits are accepted on the understanding that they remain staged throughout the Show and not removed until the time announced for the closure of the Show.
15. Prize money may be collected before 3.00pm on the day of the show at the Spring, Summer, and Autumn shows. Prize money not collected within seven days will be considered as a donation to the Society funds.
16. Children in the hall must be always supervised.

NOTE: See also Rules relating to the Pelargonium, and Autumn Shows where applicable.

PELARGONIUM SHOW RULES

1. All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor and have been in their possession for **three months**.
2. All exhibits for judging must be placed ready by 10.15am and only one entry per person per class is allowed.

The judge's decision to award any prize will be final.

BASIC GUIDANCE FOR EXHIBITORS

This is a basic guide to how to show your produce. More comprehensive information is available in the RHS Show Handbook. Exhibitors should read the schedule carefully to make sure you are entering the correct class as it may result in disqualification with the comment NAS (Not According to Schedule). If you need any help at the show, please do not hesitate to ask the Show Secretary or Show Helpers for assistance.

FLOWERS

Check the stems and bloom-quality carefully. Flowers should be fresh, have good colour and be true to type. Flowers and foliage should be free from any blemishes. Newspaper/chicken wire may be used as an aid to support stems in vases supplied by Crawley Horticultural Society. Please **DO NOT USE** Floral Foam.

VEGETABLES

Always show the correct number of exhibits as shown in the schedule. Exhibits should be fresh, uniform in size and free from pest or disease damage. Pots must be clean and free from commercial writing. Vegetable roots, carrots and potatoes should be carefully washed with a soft sponge so that the skin is not broken.

For example:

Beans (Runner or French) should be long, straight, and fresh with stalk attached. Beans may be broken in two by the judge to prove freshness.

Beetroot, carrot, parsnips etc, leaves should be removed, leaving approximately 8cm (3") of stalk.

Leeks should have clean stems and roots washed and trimmed to 8cm (3") with leaves untrimmed but kept neat on the bench.

Lettuce should be clean of any dirt or pest and exhibited with washed roots attached.

Onions should be ripe and have tops cut to about 5cm (2") from the bulb and tied neatly with string/raffia. The Society will supply a dish with suitable support for them.

Peas should have the natural bloom on the pod and the stalk attached.

Potatoes should be of uniform size without disease or broken skin.

Rhubarb should have the leaves trimmed to within 8cm (3") of the stalk.

Tomatoes should be firm and ripe with calyces attached.

FRUIT

Fruit should have a natural bloom and not be polished. Gooseberries, Raspberries, Strawberries and Blueberries should have the stalk attached. Blackcurrants, Redcurrants should be exhibited in strings. Grapes in bunches.

If you know the variety name of your fruit, vegetable flower, or plant, please complete a yellow Variety Card as this adds interest to the exhibits.

DOMSTIC CLASSES

Check the schedule carefully for size of jar or cake to be exhibited and whether you need to follow a given recipe or to make to your own recipe.

Jam, Marmalade, Curd and Chutney should be exhibited in clean glass jars. Only Jam, Marmalade and Curd should have their top covered with a wax paper disc. All labels should be clearly marked with name of contents and date made. All jar lids must be a clean twist top type. No commercial lids with date stamps etc to be used. No packet mixes to be used for any cake.

Cake Domes are provided for homemade bakes to be displayed under. Please leave cake domes in place at the end of the show.

Please attach a list of ingredients that you have used to the top of the cake domes for any home bakes. (This is to make judges aware if they are allergic to any ingredients).

Awards

A Trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor scoring the most points in the Daffodil classes. Points will be awarded as follows: 1st - 3 points, 2nd - 2 points, 3rd - 1 point.

Certificates/Awards awarded for Best Bloom in Show and for the Winner of Class A16.

The Alpine Cup will be awarded to the Exhibitor with the most points in Class B. Points will be awarded as follows: 1st - 3 points, 2nd - 2 points, 3rd - 1 point.

The Awards Presentation will be from 3.30 p.m.

Class A – Daffodils

- 1 One vase, three stems Trumpet (trumpet is equal to or longer than petals) yellow.
2. One vase, three stems Trumpet (trumpet is equal to or longer than petals) any other colour.
3. One vase, three stems Large Cupped (trumpet is more than one third but less than equal length of petals) yellow.
4. One vase, three stems Large Cupped (trumpet is more than one third but less than equal length of petals) any other colour.
5. One vase, three stems Small Cupped (petals three times length of cup) yellow
6. One vase, three stems Small Cupped (petals three times length of cup) any other colour.
7. One vase, three stems Double Daffodil, yellow.
8. One vase, three stems Double Daffodil, any other colour.
9. One vase, three stems Cyclamineus (long cup with petals bending back at tips).

10. One vase, three stems Triandrus and/or Jonquilla – single or double (petals longer than cup) with two or more flower heads on each stem.
11. One vase, three stems Poeticus Narcissi (cup is short with red fringe and white petals).
12. One vase, three stems, any other daffodil not eligible for Classes A1 - A11
13. One vase, three stems Dwarf/Rockery Daffodils
14. One vase, three stems, species Daffodil (e.g. lobularis, obvallaris. etc.)
15. One pot, maximum 18 cm (7") diameter, containing 10 daffodil/narcissi bulbs of one cultivar in bloom.
16. Three vases, three different varieties daffodil/narcissi, three stems in each vase.

Class B-Alpines

1. One pot or pan Rock plant in flower.
2. Three pots or pans Rock plants in flower.
3. One pot or pan Primula.
4. Three pots or pans Primula, three kinds, one kind per pot.
5. One pot or pan species Cyclamen.
6. One pot or pan species Cyclamen, shown for foliage effect.
7. Three pots or pans species Cyclamen, shown for foliage effect.
8. One pot or pan Ericaceae, Heather/Cassiope, etc.
9. One pot or pan Sedum.
10. One pot or pan Sempervivum.
11. One pot or pan Saxifraga.
12. One pot or pan Dwarf Bulbs, excluding Narcissi.
13. One pot or pan Dwarf Narcissi.
14. One pot or pan Dwarf Shrub.
15. One pot or pan Hardy Fern.
16. One pot or pan any other Rock Plant from genus (family) not eligible for Classes 1–15.

Notes for this Class:

- a) Pot/pan size not to exceed 20cm (8").
- b) No plants need necessarily have been grown in the pot or pan that is exhibited in and may be lifted from the open garden.
- c) Classes 13-16 – a bulb is any underground storage organ, e.g. rhizome, tuber, corm, bulb etc., for the purposes of these classes.

CLASS C – VEGETABLES

1. Rhubarb, three stems, one cultivar, leaves trimmed to 8cm (3").
2. Three heads of winter cabbage or cauliflower.
3. Five stems, Purple Sprouting Broccoli
4. Three root vegetables

CLASS D - FLOWERS

1. One vase Spring flowers, excluding bulbous plants, one cultivar, not more than seven stems.
2. One vase mixed Spring Flowers, excluding bulbous plants, not more than nine stems.
3. One vase bulbous plant excluding daffodils, not more than seven stems.
4. One vase, three stems Polyanthus, multi-flowered.
5. One vase, seven stems Primrose, one or more colours.
6. One pot or pan Primula (Primrose Type). Pot size 20cm (8").
7. One vase, three stems, Primula denticulata, candelabra, etc not eligible for classes 4 & 5.
8. One pot or pan Polyanthus (multi-flowered type). Pot size 20cm (8").
9. One vase, one stem flowering Camellia (multi-bloom).
10. One vase, one specimen Camellia flower.
11. One vase, one stem Rhododendron in flower.
12. One vase, one stem any other flowering shrub.
13. Pot plant, flowering. Pot size 20cm (8").
14. Pot plant, foliage, or fern. Pot size 20cm (8").
15. One vase, not more than five stems, Hellebores.
16. Five Hellebore flower heads, displayed in saucer supplied by the CHS.
17. One vase, three stems, Clematis.
18. Orchid.

CLASS E – DOMESTIC CLASSES (See page 3 for Rules)

1. Flap Jack made to own recipe. Cut into 5cm (2") squares. Five on a plate.
2. Six Cheese Straws, made to own recipe. Five on a plate.
3. Bakewell Tart, made to own recipe in 18cm (7") round tin.
4. Six Fruit Scones, made to own recipe. Five on a plate.
5. Lemon Drizzle cake made in 907g (2lb) loaf tin, made to own recipe.
6. Victoria Sponge not exceeding 20cm (8"), made to recipe provided.
7. Chocolate Brownies made to own recipe. Five on a plate.
8. Short bread biscuits made to own recipe. Five on a plate.
9. Marmalade, homemade in a 454g (1lb) jar (clearly marked with fruit type and date made).
10. Citrus Curd, homemade in a 454g (1lb) jar, not more than 4 weeks old.(clearly marked with fruit type and date made).
11. 6 cup cakes decorated to a Spring theme. (Decoration judged only).
12. A bottle of infused spirit.

VICTORIA SPONGE RECIPE

225g (8oz) soft margarine 225g (8oz) caster sugar 4 eggs
225g (8oz) self-raising flour 2 teaspoons baking powder

Raspberry or strawberry jam for filling. Castor sugar for dusting the top

Pre-heat oven to 108C/350F/Gas mark 4.

Grease and base line 2 x 20cm (8") sandwich tins with baking paper. Measure all the ingredients into a large bowl and beat well until thoroughly blended. Divide the mixture evenly between the 2 tins and level out. Bake for 25 minutes or until well risen, or a skewer inserted into the cake comes out clean.

Leave to cool in tins for a few minutes before turning out to cool on wire rack removing all baking paper. When completely cold, sandwich together with jam. Sprinkle the top with castor sugar to serve.

4. One Succulent. (20cm (8").

CLASS G - NOVICE CLASS

1. One vase of spring flowers.

CHILDREN'S CLASS.

Must be under 12 years.

1. Daffodils/Narcissi. 5 blooms chosen but not necessarily grown by the child, displayed in a decorated, recycled container/vase.
2. Three cupcakes decorated to Easter theme. (purchased cakes acceptable). Decoration judged only.
3. A painted/decorated hard-boiled egg.

11. One vase, three stems Patio Rose, any cultivar.

8. **C.D. Wales Cup** – Three vases of Herbaceous Perennials in flower, three kinds, one kind per vase, not less than three, maximum seven stems per vase.
9. One vase, one stem Delphinium.
10. One vase, three stems, Delphiniums, one or more cultivar.
11. Six Delphinium florets, one or more cultivars, displayed in box provided.
12. One vase, five stems Herbaceous Perennial in flower, one cultivar.
13. One vase, five stems any other flowering perennials, two or more cultivars.
14. One vase flowering Shrub, three stems, one or more cultivars.
15. One vase Pinks or Allwoodii, seven stems, one or more cultivars.
16. One dish Pansy flower heads floating in water. Dish supplied by CHS.
17. One dish Viola flower heads floating in water. Dish supplied by CHS.
18. One vase, one stem Peony, any variety,
19. One vase five stems flowering bulb, corm, tuber, or rhizome, one or more cultivars.
20. One vase, three stems single Clematis.
21. One vase, three stems, double Clematis.
22. One vase, five stems. Annuals, one or more varieties.
23. One Hanging Basket, 16" (40 cm) diameter maximum, excluding Pelargoniums (geraniums).
24. Jug of cut garden flowers, not less than three kinds, arranged for effect, jug must not exceed 2 litres.
25. Jug of cut garden flowers, not less than three kinds, arranged for effect, jug must not exceed 1 litre.
26. Orchid.
27. Pot plant flowering, excluding Zonal Pelargonium or Regal Pelargonium (**see note a**).
28. Pot plant, foliage (**see note a**).
29. Saintpaulia (African Violet) (**see note a**).
30. Streptocarpus (Cape Primrose) (**see note a**).
31. Citrus Plant.

CLASS C - ALPINES

1. Three pots or pans, Alpine plants, three kinds - one kind per pot (*see note a*).
2. Pot or pan, Campanulaceae in flower (*see note a*).
3. Pot or pan, Alpine plant in flower (*see note a*).
4. One pot or pan Lewisia in flower (*see note a*).
5. One pot or pan Dwarf Conifer (*see note a*).
6. Three pots or pans Bulbous plants, three kinds, one kind per pot (*see note a*).
7. One pot or pan Bulbous plant (*see note a*).
8. Three pots or pans Sempervivum (*see note a*).
9. One pot or pan Sempervivum (*see note a*).
10. One pot or pan Hardy Fern (*see note a*).
11. One pot or pan Sedum (*see note a*).
12. One pot or pan Cushion Plant. (*see note a*).

CLASS D - CACTI

1. Cactus (*see note a*.)

6. Asparagus, three stems.
7. Sprouting Broccoli. Five stems on a plate.
8. Any other vegetable, three on a plate.
9. Rhubarb, three stems, one cultivar, leaves trimmed to 8 cm (3").
10. Strawberries, nine on a plate.
11. Gooseberries, nine on a plate.
12. Currants, six strings on a plate, black, red, or white.
13. Any other fruit not in schedule, twelve on a plate, one cultivar.
14. Herbs, three vases, three distinct cultivars, maximum five stems per vase (**not in flower**).

CLASS F – DOMESTIC CLASS

1. One jar of preserved fruit. In a 454g (1lb) jar.
2. One jar of preserved vegetables. In a 454 (1lb) jar.
3. Six decorated cupcakes. (decoration only judged).
4. Rock Cakes. Five on a plate (made to own recipe).
5. Swiss Roll, with strawberry jam filling. (made to own recipe)
5. Banana Bread. In a 907g (2lb) loaf tin. (Made to own recipe).
7. Jar of Fruit Jelly. 454g (1lb) jar. (*Please see domestic rules for display*).
8. Chocolate Chip Cookies, made to own recipe. Five on a plate.

CLASS G - CHILDREN'S CLASS

1. Vegetable animal.
2. Jam jar of cut flowers from your garden.
